What is SB 1383?

Senate Bill (SB) 1383 requires all California cities to reduce emissions of short-lived climate pollutants (SLCP) by reducing organic waste disposal by 75% by 2025.

Organic wastes in landfills emit 20% of the state's methane, a climate super pollutant 84 times more potent than carbon dioxide. Diverting organic waste to recycling can significantly reduce these local air quality emissions.

Republic Services is here to help you understand your responsibilities and make it as easy as possible to comply with state law SB 1383 by subscribing to the Organics Collection Services.

To comply, businesses and multi-family complexes must first separate their organic waste from other waste and then subscribe to the collection service.

Together we can help the State meet its goal to reduce organic waste disposal by 75%.



Mandatory Organics Recycling

All businesses and multi-family complexes are required to recycle their organic waste.

If you own a business or multi-family complex, you are required to divert organic materials from the landfill by subscribing to and participating in the organics collection service provided by Republic Services.

Organic waste includes food waste, food-soiled paper, and landscape trimmings and prunings.

If you have a cart for food waste only, you may place the food waste and food-soiled paper in clear plastic bags. If you have a curbside cart for commingled food and green waste, the food waste may be placed in paper bags, but no plastic or compostable bags will be allowed.

Republic Services provides small carts for organics collection service at no additional charge. **Note:** Default services at no additional charge include one 64-gallon organics cart and/or one 95-gallon recycle cart collected one time per week. Edible Food Recovery

SB 1383 requires certain businesses to donate the maximum amount of edible food they would otherwise dispose of to food recovery organizations. SB 1383 places mandated food donors into two tiers.

Tier 1: Effective immediately

- Wholesale Food Vendors
- Food Service Providers
- Food Distributors
- Grocery Stores (more than 10,000 sq. feet)

Tier 2: January 1, 2024

- Hotels (with on-site food facility and 200+ rooms)
- State Agency Cafeterias (more than 5,000 sq. feet or 250 seats)
- Health Facilities (with on-site food facility and 100 beds)
- Large Venues and Events
- Restaurant Facilities (more than 5,000 sq. feet or 250 seats)
